





Did you know Angel Fire has a rare high altitude, alpine wetland? Very few exist at 8,500 feet or higher. Beavers built their dam on Cieneguilla Creek just above the culverts under N. Angel Fire Road. Over the past few years, this has created an amazing ecosystem of diverse and unique proportion!

One of the interesting amphibious plants found in this ecosystem is Water (or Swamp) Smartweed. This day, it was blooming prolifically across the wetlands. Ducks love this stuff! They were swimming all about in it, nipping here and there.

Water smartweeds have a long history of human use. Several Plains Indian tribes used the species as a food source, while other groups derived medicines from the roots, stems, and leaves. The term "smartweed" is thought to be a more sanitized version of the original word "arsmart" for the use of the plant in medieval times to relieve itching and swelling of the human posterior.

1st Place The Rio Grande Gorge Page Steed Angel Fire Garden Club



The Taos subrange of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains rise to over 13,000 feet and serve as a spectacular backdrop to the 800-foot deep Rio Grande Gorge.

This geological feature in northern New Mexico was formed by the watercourse of the Rio Grande River following a tectonic chasm, or rift. Beginning near the Colorado border, the approximately 50-mile gorge runs from northwest to southeast of Taos, New Mexico, through the basalt flows of the Taos Plateau volcanic field. The gorge is home to an abundance of wildlife, including mule deer, red-tailed hawks, mountain blue-birds, prairie dogs and big horn sheep. Ancient pinon and juniper forests are home to 500-year-old trees.



Rocky Mountain Bighorn sheep did not

inhabit the Rio Grande Gorge of New Mexico until 2006, when the Taos Pueblo released 23 onto the landscape. The Department of Game and Fish followed with the release of 25 additional bighorns in 2007. Today their population has grown to about 280, and they have expanded their habitat to craggy mountainous areas in nearby Red River and Questa, New Mexico.

This young juvenile surprised us when it ran right past us and gingerly scrambled up onto nearby rock ledges. He was curious and stopped long enough for me to capture a few shots.


